Definition (description, specification, qualification)	<p>Migrants and displaced people are often exposed to greater risks of violence because of their status and vulnerability. They might experience conflict-related or gang violence, being trafficked or exploited as workers in low-skilled jobs and more. Violence, exploitation and abuse can affect the persons' physical and mental health in the short and longer term, impairing their ability to learn and socialise.</p> <p>This ARI relates to HA_ARI_2 'Reduction of violence and fostering protection' but looks specifically at the response provided to victims of violence and abuse (reaction rather than prevention).</p> <p><u>Protection/rehabilitation services</u> refer to medical and psycho-social support, but also legal and other measures that support healing, rehabilitation and socio-economic reintegration and education inclusion of victims of violence and abuse, as well as their families.</p> <p>A migrant is someone who changes their country of usual residence, irrespective of the reason for migration or legal status. The term includes a number of well-defined legal categories of people, such as 'migrant workers' or 'refugees'; as well as those whose status is not specifically defined under international law, such as international students.</p> <p>A forcibly displaced person is someone who has been forced to move, within or across borders, due to armed conflict, persecution, terrorism, human rights violations and abuses, violence, the adverse effects of climate change, natural disasters, development projects or a combination of these factors. <u>Displaced persons include refugees, IDPs and asylum seekers</u>, which also constitute a sub-group of the terminology migrants mentioned above.</p> <p>It is recommended that the term 'migrants and forcibly displaced people' be used as a single definition to include all categories of people migrating. This is in line with Switzerland's inclusive approach to addressing migration, taking into account the mixed nature of migration.</p> <p><u>Calculation (see disaggregation):</u> a+b</p>

Rationale	<p><u>Theory of change</u></p> <p>If migrants and forcibly displaced people who have experienced violence, exploitation and abuse have access to protection and rehabilitation services, then they can recover better from trauma and return to normalcy, because these services address both physical and mental health impacts and also assist the individual in their socio-economic reintegration after the violence they have experienced.</p>
